Here, Gratitude, Now, Grace! by Rev. Dan Holland

I bring to you an offering of four words — as a window into my spiritual journey — which I've held onto from the experience of a retreat almost ten years ago that was a turning point in my call to ministry.

I didn't really know what I was doing there. I had way too much work back at home, and it was hard to imagine what tangible benefit a prayer retreat was going to be for my real life. The leader of the retreat invited us to "marinate in prayer." He told us that Sabbath is *the* spiritual practice of the Christian life because it is the time we set aside to relate with God. That week, our Sabbath took the form of silence every morning from the time we woke up until after lunch. It was the longest silence I could remember. As we prayed with scripture on the first morning, the word that seemed to speak to me, in fact the only word that spoke at all in the midst of the morning silence was the word "here." It was a reminder that regardless of when or where "here" may be, that's exactly where God is. I walked the grounds of the retreat center I saw the stability of God in the boulders in the stream. I saw the sustenance of God as the animals foraged on the forest floor. I saw the guidance of God as the path extended before and behind me as far as I could see… In the freedom of the birds, the constant call of the flowing water: no matter where I looked I saw a revelation of the character of God. It is true that God is everywhere... and when I have eyes to see, God is especially here.

The next morning we walked the labyrinth. I was acutely aware of the winding path, people walking near me, passing in either direction, no way to know who's on the way in, who's on the way out. As I walked I was struck by gratitude. The concept was utterly foreign to my then-present world of stress and isolation. As I prayed for hope, the sun began to break through the clouds, as I prayed to know the spirit's presence in my life, rain fell gently on my face. It happened at the same time, the mixture of sun and rain; it was the perfect metaphor of hope and presence... the sun shined, always searching for a way through the clouds—regardless of my mood; the rain fell on the just and the unjust alike. As I stood there getting wet, I realized that the things in my life which had been weighing me down weren't given by God as burdens, but rather as opportunities— perhaps even blessings. It was an invitation to give up some of the shoulds and oughts, to let go of some of the feelings of failure and inadequacy that I carried around and instead, to recognize, to enjoy and to be grateful for the gifts of God.

I don't remember the specific time that week when the third word came into my consciousness. I guess that's fitting because the word was "now" and what it meant for me is to live in the present... not caught up in anxiety about the future or worry about the past. "Now" is the time in which I get to choose who I am and who I will be. "Now" is the concrete expression of my priority which is neither a promise nor a memory. Each and every moment, "now" is the only time I have.

The final word is "grace" and it is what has allowed me to remain in ministry for the last decade. I will never forget the feeling when, after speaking with her for half an hour, the spiritual director at the retreat looked me in the eye and asked if I was one of those people who was trying to put Jesus out of a job. She had seen right through me... I was. Somehow my work in ministry had become all about me. Without realizing it I had lost my ability to listen to God because I was so busy trying to be God. But her question brought freedom because it showed me the truth of where I was and also offered the way to get back to right relationship—grace. I'm not called to be a savior (thank God that job's already been taken), but I am called to participate in the savior's work. I'm not called to be perfect, but I am called to be faithful.

The words and invitations of that week almost a decade ago resonate strongly in my life even to this day. And so I offer them to you, in the hope that we all might remember with gratitude to rely on God's grace in every "here" and in every "now."

Family Playdate: A time for families of all ages to participate in a fun activity together the 3rd Sun. of each month after worship.


Men's Breakfast: A gathering of UPB Men the 1st and 3rd Tues. of the month at 7:30am at Bowie Bob Evans.

A Christian needs to exercise and nourish his spirit in order to have a healthy spirit. How does one strengthen that spirit? If one engages in daily conversations with God, studying God's Word and books relating to living as a Christian, one's spirit will not wither. If a person's faith in Christ is action-oriented in daily encounters, that person is strengthening her spirit's tone and making preparations for her life beyond the grave. If a person ever reaches the point where he/she doesn't feel the need to learn more about what it means to live each day with Christ at the helm, that person has probably developed a sagging spirit that needs rejuvenation.

One can have surgery to restore better vision, to walk without a cane, to remove an abscessed tooth, and such actions can



improve the tone of one's heath. However, nothing can transform a sagging spirit and improve the tone of one's spirit more than a renewed commitment to know Christ better and let Him direct one's daily endeavors. In searching for a more meaningful life, we can become more diligent in searching God's Word. We can strengthen our relationships with other people who have picked Christ as their mentor and their Savior. We can support one another as we consider what it means to imitate Christ. Toning one's spirit is a lifelong commitment, and most of us have so much to learn.

Children's Corner by Children's Director Nikki Hillary

The new Sunday school year is ahead and we are excited about it. There will be two classes, one for the elementary kids, and another for preschool and kindergarten kids. Kids are welcome to attend the class that best fits their needs.

Elementary Sunday School

We are going with a new curriculum called Power Express. This calls for several teachers to present the same Bible story or theme over six to eight weeks each using a different participatory teaching method.

We start our Fall classes with the study "Abraham and Sarah" contained in selected passages in Genesis 12 through 21. The focus of the study is God promised to be with Abraham and Sarah just as He promises to be with us today. Eight teachers will use eight different lesson plans on "Abraham and Sarah" each through methods of art, storytelling, creative cookery, science, games, computer, music, drama, or video. So, there is plenty of opportunity of adults in our church to use their special gifts to teach the children one Sunday (during a period of three months) which will do wonders for the kids; and provide the satisfaction of educating the kids for the adults.

Preschool & Kindergarten Sunday School Class

For the younger class, we are going to use the curriculum distributed by the Presbyterian Church (USA) called "Weebelievers." The focus of the year-long study is *God made* me and I am a child of God using various verses from the Bible and activities. We aim to instill the concept that each one of them is a child of God and loved by God. The children will come to know of God's love through Jesus Christ and others in their lives who love and care for them. such as parents, church, school, community.

Sunday School Staff

There will be two adults in each class. The older class will be taught by a teacher and greeted and taken care of by a "Shepherd". Shepherd is a "Power Express name" for the teacher's helper. The younger class will be staffed by a teacher and a teacher's aide.

Children in Worship

We believe that it is important for the children to worship with all members of their church family and take part in singing, praying, worshipping, and become familiar with the order of service. Therefore we are making some changes to our Sunday school schedule.

The Elementary Sunday School students will:

- begin in the service for a short time <u>every</u> Sunday before they are dismissed for classes ;
- begin in the service for a longer time on the <u>third</u> Sundays, which will include a children's sermon;
- begin and worship with all for <u>the entire service</u> on special Sundays, like Easter, Christmas, and Thanksgiving. There will be no Sunday school on those days.

We are looking forward to the new Sunday school year and to welcoming the children back in the classrooms!
