MOVING FORWARD

s of March 14, I will have been serving alongside you as your Interim Pastor for a year. From my perspective it has been a good year; I hope you are feeling the same. If there are concerns or issues you would like to discuss, please share them with me. I would appreciate hearing them from you.

You are a very special congregation with hopes and dreams for the future. You realize moving forward necessitates change. Change never comes easily. It's hard to let go of the past, a past that has felt so comfortable and secure. And yet, you are doing so; and in the process you are prayerfully making changes that will hopefully help you to become an even stronger church.

Interims come with an agenda that includes various tasks to help you prepare for your next installed pastor: coming to terms with history; assessing the church's present and future identity; empowering the church's lay leadership; facilitating links with the denomination; and facilitating a commitment to a new installed pastor. If you would like to review these and other tasks in greater detail, I encourage you to read pages 36-38 in the 2012 Annual Report. Copies are available in the narthex or you can read it from the website.

Thus far, the primary areas of emphasis for the United Parish of Bowie have been helping you to look at yourself in the mirror, making changes that promote spiritual development through worship and Christian education for ALL ages, and developing the infrastructure of how you do the worshipful work and business of the church. In the process, you have been strengthening the identity of who you are and realizing you have grown and changed since first chartered as a church. There is an increase in denominational ties with Board members who are apprised of various opportunities that exist. Committee Chairs receive information about special denominational opportunities, especially in the areas of mission and education.

Strengthening patterns of leadership in positive and creative ways for the good of the whole church is a task that I believe needs to be addressed in greater depth. You have EXCELLENT leadership, but it is important that the church prepares for the future by equipping the saints. Yes, you. Who me? You say. Yes, you.

So I encourage you to think about and pray about where within the life of the church you might explore and use your God-given gifts and abilities. Do you have an interest, a hope, a desire? Perhaps God is calling you to explore and develop your skills in that area. It's normal to feel "So and So" is already doing a really great job. I could never do what he/she is doing. I don't have the time. Chances are they felt exactly the same way when they started. So I encourage you to talk with your Board Members and/or Committee Chairs and see where you might become involved. Within each committee are long term and

short term tasks/ministries to do that build up the church. You are a gifted congregation with many Godgiven gifts and abilities. As a faithful member, you are called to share these gifts.

Each task in the interim process is meant to help facilitate a commitment to a new installed pastor. Your Board has renewed my contract for 6 months. This is the normal procedure after the completion of a year. From here on out, my contract may be renewed in increments of 6 months, 3 months, or month to month. Each increment depends on where you are in the search process. It also serves as a reminder that the Interim may not be the next installed pastor.

By the time you receive the newsletter, you will have had the opportunity to participate in two focus groups and take part in a survey, each a step in completing the mission study. Your Mission Study Team members are Jan Barbato, Betsy Burian, Bill Collins, Sue Kennedy, and Herb Sheppard. Each thanks you for your commitment of time as they embark upon preparing the mission study report for review by you and the Board.

This means that in the near future, the Board will share with you the process for selecting the Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC).

You are well on your way. It is my continuous prayer that your process of self-study, search, and call will continue to occur in a climate of honesty, healing, dreaming, building, and celebrating as the Body of Christ. May my time with you continue to be a time of renewal and growth. May the light of Christ continue to shine in you and around you and through you.

Board, the Mission Study Committee (Jan Barbato, Betsy Burian, Bill Collins, Sue Kennedy, and Herb Sheppard), began meeting in November. The committee is charged with the task of gathering information and data from a variety of sources, including the congregation. This information will then be used to write a report that shows who we are as a congregation, where we believe God is leading us, our hopes and dreams for the future of the United Parish, and what we are looking for in our next pastor. In order to hear from as many people as possible, the committee scheduled two 90 minute focus groups: Session 1 was held January 27 and January 28. Session 2 was held February 24 and February 25. There was also a Congregation Life Survey given on February 10. The completed Mission Study Report will be given to the Pastor Nominating Committee and used in writing the Church Information Form which will be viewed by potential candidates. The committee thanks everyone for participating in this very important process.

BOOK CLUB

April 5 Poisonwood Bible, Barbara Kingsolver The Poisonwood Bible is a story told by the wife and four daughters of Nathan Price, a fierce, evangelical Baptist who takes his family and mission to the Belgian Congo in 1959. They carry with them everything they believe they will need from home, but soon find that all of it -- from garden seeds to Scripture -- is calamitously transformed on African soil. What follows is a suspenseful epic of one family's tragic undoing and remarkable reconstruction over the course of three decades in postcolonial Africa.

May 3 Thunderstruck, Erik Larson

A true story of love, murder, and the end of the world's "great hush" In Thunderstruck, Erik Larson tells the interwoven stories of two men--Hawley Crippen, a very unlikely murderer, and Guglielmo Marconi, the obsessive creator of a seemingly supernatural means of communication--whose lives intersect during one of the greatest criminal chases of all time. Set in Edwardian London and on the stormy coasts of Cornwall, Cape Cod, and Nova Scotia, Thunderstruck evokes the dynamism of those years when great shipping companies competed to build the biggest, fastest ocean liners, scientific advances dazzled the public with visions of a world transformed. and the rich outdid one another with ostentatious displays of wealth. Thunderstruck is splendid narrative history from a master of the form.

June 7 An Edible History of Humanity, Tom Standage

Throughout history, food has done more than simply provide sustenance. It has acted as a tool of social transformation, political organization, geopolitical competition, industrial development, military conflict and economic expansion. An Edible History of Humanity is an account of how food has helped to shape and transform societies around the world, from the emergence of farming in China by 7,500 BCE to today's use of sugar cane and corn to make ethanol. Food has been a kind of technology, a tool that has changed the course of human progress. It helped to found, structure, and connect together civilizations worldwide, and to build empires and bring about a surge in economic development through industrialization. Food has been employed as a military and ideological weapon. And today, in the culmination of a process that has been going on for thousands of years, the foods we choose in the supermarket connect us to global debates about trade, development and the adoption of new technologies. Drawing from many fields including genetics, archaeology, anthropology, ethno-botany and economics, the story of these food-driven transformations is a fully satisfying account of the whole of human history.
