Whether we write about something from the past that has been meaningful, something in the present that we're dealing with now or some vision of a hoped for future, the guidelines are: 1. that what you write speaks of something that moves you, 2. it involves an observed phenomenon or lived experience and 3. when you give them to me (on paper or email) let me know if they are allowed to be shared... some may make it into the next newsletter or even in the weekly email!

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Board Corner

Over the last quarter the Board has worked in several areas. One focus has been on redirecting the church's savings from CD's that currently have an almost negligible return to some other options that make better use of the Church's money. After due consideration the Board sought and received the approval of the congregation to place \$25k in a secure fund through Premier Planning Group of Annapolis. The other \$25k is to be invested with Oiko Credit which provides loans to individuals (predominantly women with families) to allow them the resources to start and maintain businesses that move them and their families from a menial existence to one of self sufficiency. Congregational approval was also acquired for this since Oiko is not Federally insured but has never missed paying it's investors in 20 years. Our return on this Oiko investment is set at 2% (better than what we were earning with our current CDs).

The other large item that has transpired this quarter was the feasibility and cost of paving the UPB parking lot. The Ministry Support Committee headed by Becky DeMeo presented the Board with four bids for the endeavor and made their recommendations. The Board approved the recommendations and the expenditure of \$45k of the Building Fund for this purpose was presented and approved in a Congregational Meeting on March 27th. Permits were secured through both PG County and the City of Bowie. A contractor was chosen and the lot is paved! Thanks again to the Ministry Support Committee for a job well done. Special thanks to the project manager, Tom Chin.

The Board continues it's focus on implementing the new Committee Structure with the hope that these Committees and their members will take

ownership of the tasks before them and decentralize much of the work to be done from the Board and the Pastor. The Board under the leadership of Pastor Dan is committed to looking for opportunities to reach out and "serve" the greater community.

In closing, it is of great importance to the Board that it keeps the Congregation informed of it's activities and be open to input and concerns from any member of the congregation. Board Meeting Minutes are kept in a binder in the church library if anyone would like to delve deeper into the activities of the Board. The Board is meant to reflect the membership of the Congregation and therefore is always open to input and suggestions from any member.



Get to Know UPB: Becky DeMeo, Ministry Support Committee Chair

Becky DeMeo grew up New York, the eighth of nine kids. Faith was important to her family. She has wonderful memories of attending church as a child and participating in Sunday School and a variety of children's ministry pageants. Becky moved to New Jersey as a teenager, where she met her husband Joe. They were married in 1963 and moved to Bowie, Maryland in 1968, where they raised their two children, Joey and Lisa.

The United Parish of Bowie has been blessed to have Becky DeMeo as a member since 1975, when she was invited to attend worship by a friend. Coming to UPB, Becky felt "like she was home." She has been an active member and leader in the church, serving in almost every way possible. A banker for almost 20 years, off and on, Becky has been doing the UPB bookkeeping since 1985. So, it made sense for her to take on the role of Ministry Support Committee Chair.

Becky and her family are a part of UPB's history. When Becky's son Joey was killed in a car crash at only 19 years old, the congregation pulled together in support and was able to finish up the brand new sanctuary in time to hold Joey's memorial service, the first service conducted in the UPB sanctuary. The kitchen was donated in his memory, as well as the beautiful desk in the pastor's office. The DeMeo family is also a part of the woodwork. Becky's husband Joe built the shelves in the library, the cabinets in the preschool Sunday school room, as well as the storage shed outside.

In addition to all she does at UPB, Becky is part of a woman's volleyball league, a bowling league, and a bridge club. She loves spending time with her granddaughters Sarah, Julia, and Anna. When asked if there was anything people at UPB didn't know about her, she thought folks might not know that she has no middle name and that she was once a model and participated in several fashion shows, including one with Grace Kelly in attendance.



Alissa Barbato received her MFA in Ceramics from the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) on 5/21/2011. According to her, this will be her final degree. She will be moving back to Annapolis later this summer, and, hopefully, finding a job.

Lenten Dinner Series Summary

We hope the Lenten Dinner Series provided a time of fellowship and informative presentations about the wonderful organizations the United Parish assists. These organizations included Central Union Mission, Bowie Food Pantry, Family Crisis Center, One Great Hour of Sharing, and Sarojini mission work in India and Indonesia. Here's a summary in case you missed it!

We were fortunate to have Central Union Mission's executive director, David Treadwell, as principal speaker, along with a staff person who is also a former program participant. Two current participants also were there to tell their stories. Although United Parish's contributions have been backpacks and gifts to assist the Mission's special programs for children, we learned that its primary program is to get homeless men off the streets and into a residential program that prepares them to become employable and self-sufficient again. A key element is a spiritual transformation program. One goal is to reunite them with their families. Central Union Mission is in its 126th year.

Two representatives from the Bowie Food Pantry gave us a brief history of the Pantry. It started as a City program; now it is an Interfaith program located at the Christian Community Presbyterian Church. The City still provides partial support to

the Pantry through grants. About eighteen-to-twenty clients come each day the Pantry is open, primarily Monday-Wednesday-Friday mornings. Recently, the Pantry also began opening on Tuesday evenings from six to seven. All clients are interviewed to assess need. Most participants come in once a week. In 2010 the Pantry served 200 clients a month, and provided 267,000 pounds of food. Volunteers use monetary contributions to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables to supplement donated items. Food Pantry personnel also offer resource and referral services for state community assistance and job listings.

The recently appointed director of the Family Crisis Center told us about half of the abused women who contact the Center are placed in the Safe Passage Emergency Shelter, which now can house up to 55 persons daily. The Crisis Center maintains a Crisis Hotline It also provides a Family Violence Intervention Clinic, which conducts individual and group therapy sessions for abusers, survivors, and victims of domestic violence. Sessions are also available for Spanish speakers. The County's Department of Family Services has a program which allows Safe Passage and Clinic participations to receive free tuition at Prince George's Community College for training/certification in a variety of areas.

Using a teleconference format, Susan Sanders, the Minister and Team Leader for Global Sharing of Resources (One Hour of Sharing) for the United Church of Christ shared some facts about the program which should be helpful to our congregation. This program's three priorities are disaster assistance, refugee aid, and help for developing countries. Eight denominations participate in this program; however each one maintains its own financial accounts. This explains why the United Parish sends half of our

donations to the Presbyterian Church and half to the United Church of Christ (UCC). The Ecumenical Committee meets three times a year. One purpose of these meetings is to identify joint projects. We learned that the current national UCC budget for One Great Hour of Sharing is three million dollars.

Our own member, Josi Hillary, a key participant, gave an inspiring talk about the Sarojini Orphanage Trust program whose mission is to touch the lives of the disadvantaged high school graduates from remote parts of India and Indonesia by supporting them with a university education to become professionals and transforming agents in their community. Extreme economic inequality coupled with the belief of those at the top of the caste system that the lower caste people are where they are meant to be. It was this state of affairs that inspired him to get involved first in India, and later in Indonesia.
