

Dear Friends in Christ,

The rain came down, the streams rose, and the winds blew and beat against that house; yet it did not fall... (Mt 7:25)

Welcome back from vacation! Most people it seems took at least some time off this summer to enjoy a little vacation time. I spent much of August in New Haven, a very pleasant college town, and a place quite a bit cooler in August than Maryland.

Now that summer is over, we have to start thinking about the year before us, which promises to be a very interesting one. At very least we are all going to be interested to see how the Pastor Nominating Committee's work comes along. It's not possible, of course, to say when its work will be finished, but I think that we are all hoping that by the end of this year the committee will have selected a candidate. Let's all keep the members of this committee in our prayers, asking God to help them to find the right person to lead the United Parish in the coming years. When the committee makes its selection, this person will be presented to a congregational meeting and a vote will be taken. Ultimately, then, it is the congregation that will accept or reject the committee's nominee.

In the remaining time that I have as your interim pastor, I hope to have the office running more smoothly and have the new year well planned, so that the new pastor can step into his/her new role without any unnecessary difficulties. Also, I've planned this fall to spend much of my time on teaching classes. I will be teaching the Adult Sunday education course, September 16 through October 21, which will be a continuation of the church history series that was started more than a year ago. The subject will be the British Reformation, 1520s – 1680s. It's fortunate – perhaps providential – that this particular

period has come up while I'm with you because this was my minor field of study for my Ph.D. So I'm looking forward to discussing with this group the divorces of Henry VIII, the "Invincible Armada," the Puritan Revolution – and much more.

I'm also going to be teaching a New Members class in November. There are a number of people who have been attending the church for some time without having actually become members. If you are one of these and feel that it is time that you became a member, please let me know and sign up for the course.

Finally, I will be teaching a "Foundations" course on Tuesday evenings for six weeks, September 18 through October 23. This is for people – perhaps most of us – who need a refresher course in the basic theology of the church. We will be looking at the Apostles' Creed, unpacking a different phrase or sentence each week. What is the relationship between the Father, Son and Holy Spirit? Why is it important that Jesus suffered under Pontius Pilate? Did Jesus really descend into hell? Why do we say that we are a catholic church? These and other questions will be addressed and discussed in an informal setting. It will also be an opportunity for members to bring their own questions to the table, whatever they might be.

At the end of the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus told the parable of two men, one who built his house on the rock, and another who built on sand. We all know the message of the story: the foundation of our lives should be built on Jesus Christ and a commitment to sincerely living out our faith in him. What Jesus assumes in the story, though, is also important: we should expect that our houses will be threatened by pelting rain, rising streams, and beating winds. I invite you, then, to set aside time this fall to attend the "Foundations" of your lives.


"I am the Church, you are the Church, and we are the Church together. All who follow Jesus all around the world, yes, we're the Church together.

OUTSIDE FLOWERS



Recently the Outside Flowers Committee placed four containers with tropical plants on the patio and planted two trees in the island in the parking lot and nine bushes in the patio flower beds, in the front of the church. The two largest containers have Adonidia (Christmas) palms underlaid with Crotons and the two smaller containers have Majesty palms with trailing variegated Ivy, joining the two containers with Boxwood plants by the front door. The new trees for the island are Crape Myrtles, "Pink Velour," a variety marked by spring and fall leaf color, bright pink blossoms in the summer and exfoliating bark in the winter; these trees will grow to a height of about 10 feet. The new plantings on the sunny side of the patio were placed between the existing Ilex and Azalea bushes and consist of shrub roses with repeat blooms of white and pink, variety "Rainbow Knock Out." On the shady side are large yellow-flowering tropicals, Thryallis (Galphimia). We hope all members of and visitors to the church enjoy the new plants. Later in the fall, in cooperation with the Buildings and Grounds Committee, we plan a Cleanup Day, on a Saturday morning to be announced.

SPECIAL OFFERING FOR SOTI



Sunday, Sept. 30, we will be taking a special offering to assist the Sarojini Orphanage Trust Inc. in educating poor children in India and Indonesia. SOTI is a non-profit organization formed by Nikki

and Josi Hillary. SOTI provides tuition grants to six poor High School graduates for Nursing and Teaching training. One beneficiary will graduate this year from a Nursing College in Bangalore, India.

Despite being born in poverty, these children have managed to get High School educations through support from organizations. Few children can afford a university education, which costs a minimum of \$2,500 per year to pay for tuition, food, books etc. With university training, they will return to their communities to help others.

During 2006, SOTI provided tuition and other grants totaling \$13,000. Our Parish was a generous contributor. SOTI has recently undertaken a major campaign to sponsor four more Indonesian students to train as nurses. If this campaign is successful, these students will enroll in 2008.
