Pastor's Corner: Spring is in the air

Finally, signs of spring... a couple of sixty degree days strung together; crocuses are poking their purple and

white petals up from the dark brown beauty bark; daffodils are making their presence known, some in full bloom others waiting for a few more days of sunshine... Maybe it's because this was the first real experience of winter I can remember (we didn't have winter in Seattle or San Francisco like we do here) but I have been struck by the beauty that is emerging in my first spring in Bowie, and I have been told it's not even in full swing yet. I look forward to seeing the cherry blossoms down town, but at this point I am just happy to see signs of life again. There were people in my neighborhood barb-queing last weekend, and all sorts of new birds are showing up at our backyard birdfeeder and when I walk the dog in the evening, there are about ten times as many people out walking as there were a month ago.

A couple of days ago, while I was walking (one of the first times since I've been here that it wasn't dark by the time I took the dog out) I was drawn to one particular tree in our neighborhood. It was different from the others. Some of the trees in the area didn't have any leaves on them at all; they still looked like it was the dead of winter. A few trees that I could see had a couple of brown leaves still clinging to the branches; apparently no-one had told them fall was long gone. Most of the trees were doing exactly what you might expect as we head into spring... they had buds almost ready to erupt with new leaves that just were not quite there vet. But this tree, this one tree that caught my attention, had all four seasons represented in its branches. On a couple of branches there were three or four little brown leaves who had not yet

felt gravity's pull. The outermost branch tips were bare and a light tan color, still in the dead of winter. Closer in to the trunk, the buds of spring were evident and new leaves were getting ready. And then in one place on the tree, I do not know if it was because the sun hit those branches more of the day or if it was just some fluke of nature, but there was a patch of green leaves that were well on their way to maturation.

The tree was a fascinating phenomenon in and of itself, and I began to think to myself, isn't that the way life works. That tree is just like us. I am convinced that in each one of us, at any given time, there are all sorts of things going on and in a sense the seasons are all represented.

Summer: What is strong and vibrant within me? What brings joy and is going well? Fall: What is in me that could be (and maybe should be) let go of? What gets in the way? Winter: What is lying dormant within me, biding time until the conditions are right? Spring: What is bursting forth with new life?

While some of the seasons may be more pleasant than others, each of them is necessary and each of them is part of the rhythm of life. There is something about the Lenten journey that echoes the seasons, from strength, to letting go, dormancy and then... what we're all waiting for: new life bursting forth from the places that looked and felt like death. With all its signs of life, Spring is a season of hope. As the days get longer, the flowers pop up from the ground, the cherry blossoms bloom, and the barbecues flare up, may they be reminders for you and for me that hope endures. And even more, may they be reminders of *why* hope endures, because nothing...not even death could hold down our Lord Jesus Christ. Easter is almost here! Alleluia and Amen.

Nikki Hillary's Trip to India:



Anand Niketan, Orissa State, India where Nikki has been volunteering and teaching

The vision of Anand Niketan, a residential school in Orissa State, India is to give protection and quality education to the children of Indian Missionaries working in all parts of India. This is the only school in North India meeting the educational needs of missionary children.

Anand Niketan is the only institution operating under Anand Education Society that was established as a non-profit organization in the State of Tamil Nadu and also registered at the federal level to receive assistance from abroad. The work started in November 1992. Current Board of Directors are volunteering their time and are made up of three medical professionals, one Pastor and the rest are educationists. Sixteen years ago, the founders of this school chose this State for the school because Orissa is in the tribal belt that hosts up of 62 tribal groups. Despite the gruesome murders of many missionaries, pastors and evangelists, tremendous revivals are taking place in Orissa and the tribals are gradually accepting Jesus as their savior.

The school is in Lamptapet District, a relatively peaceful area, 3,000' above sea level and an ideal location for a residential school. Adjacent to the school is Asha Kiran, a missionary hospital.

The school has good infrastructure facilities with adequate class rooms, playfields, dormitories for students, staff residences, guest house etc., to house 250 students from I to XII standard. It is affiliated at the federal level with the Indian Central Board of Education, a regulatory authority.


