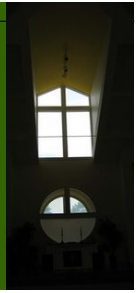

## A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR JERI

### INTENTIONAL INTERIM MINISTRY...THE PROCESS IS UNDERWAY

As your Gap Minister, the plan is for me to be with you through the end of April. As your Board and I explore the interim pastor process, the following will occur:

1. At the Board meeting, held February 7, Rev. Dick McFail - Stated Clerk of National Capital Presbytery and Rev. Nancy Clark – a representative from the Committee on Ministry who has previous experience as an interim, discussed the process for calling an interim minister and the role and expectations of an interim minister and the Board during the months ahead before you call someone to be your next head of staff pastor.
2. The Rev. Dr. Wilson Gunn, the General Presbyter for National Capital Presbytery, preached on Sunday, February 12. Following the service he was available for questions and answers during your time of food and fellowship.

## Inside this issue:

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In the days and weeks ahead, your Board will identify specific roles and responsibilities for an interim, interview potential candidates, and then call someone who will lead you through the next phase of your journey. In the document "INTENTIONAL INTERIM MINISTRY GUIDELINES - the introduction to the description of the interim period and process" congregations are reminded:

*The interim period is the "between times" for a congregation bridging the time when their installed pastor has resigned and departed and another pastor is called and installed. This period in the life of a congregation is not a tragedy, rather it is a creative and dynamic moment in their corporate faith journey and history.*

*"Whenever a minister leaves a congregation, for whatever reason (death, retirement, acceptance of a new call, being asked to resign, etc.), the departure always evokes some kind of crisis. It also provides a congregation with an occasion for new opportunity in ministry. It is indeed a time of freedom for you, as lay leaders, to make of this occasion what you will. It is one time in the life of a congregation when everyone expects change, and you have the choice of being victims of change or of taking advantage of the opportunity to share in the planning of that change." - Phillip Porcher, "What You Can Expect from an Interim Pastor and an Interim Consultant," (The Alban Institute), p.2.*

I realize the between times of Dan's departure and the call of an installed pastor can seem like a long time and some may begin to wonder how the church will manage until someone is called. This is a normal reaction to such a situation. But herein lies the hope for the future: *...those who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint. ~Isaiah 40:3.*

May you claim this promise! And, for those of you who were here on January 29 for the reaffirmation of your baptismal vows: remember the vows of your baptism and share the significance of such with those who were not present in worship. Recall how you are a beloved child of God, loved more than you can even begin to imagine. Know that God loves

you too much to leave you the way you are. Take time to share with the world whose you are (not who you are – there is a difference), and to know that the Spirit of God will guide you and direct you in the days ahead.

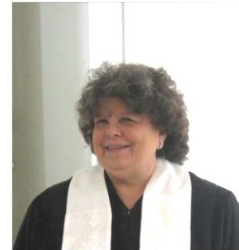

May you trust and abide with the collective wisdom of the group you elected to represent you. Keep them in your daily prayers. God's love within you,  
And your care and support for one another  
in acts of ministry

## ASK THE PASTOR: THE LENTEN SEASON – WHY DO WE DO WHAT WE DO? A CRASH COURSE ABOUT LENT



Ash Wednesday, which is February 22 this year, marks the beginning of the liturgical season of Lent. Some of you may be wondering: What is the purpose of Lent in the Reformed tradition? I counted the days

from Ash Wednesday to Easter and there are more than 40 days. Why is that? Why do we in the Reformed tradition participate in Ash Wednesday with the imposition of ashes? Isn't that for people who are Roman Catholic? Are we supposed to give up something for Lent? What other days are celebrated during the Lenten Season? So many questions. Wish I had some answers.

What follows is a crash course about Lent: *Lent 101 – Part 1*

The 40 days of Lent begin on Ash Wednesday and end at dusk on the Saturday before Easter. There are more than 40 days on the calendar between Ash Wednesday and Easter because the Sundays between Ash Wednesday and Easter are not counted. Why is that? It's because every Sunday, including the Sundays during Lent, is considered to be an Easter Sunday - that is, a weekly celebration of the resurrection of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Reclaimed by Reformed churches in the last few decades, Ash Wednesday is the entry point for Lenten preparation. It is a service rich in ritual and symbolism. Ashes have a long history in biblical and church traditions. In Scripture ashes or dust symbolize frailty or death (Gen. 18:27), sadness or mourning (Esther 4:3), judgment (Lam. 3:16), and repentance (Jon. 3:6). All these images are caught up in the church's use of ashes as a symbol appropriate for Lent. Ash Wednesday and the season of Lent provide time to explore the mystery at the heart of the gospel that being a Christian means a new life through Christ.

Participants on Ash Wednesday may choose to come forward for a minister to mark their foreheads with the sign of the cross in ashes, saying words such as, "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Gen. 3:19). With these words, disciples are reminded of their mortality and, when combined with the sign of the cross, they are also reminded of the hope in the resurrection. Furthermore, the imposition of ashes serves as reminder of one's baptism when sealed with the mark of Christ on your forehead. What is invisible, becomes visible for a short period of time.

The season of Lent, as a preparation for Easter, is a historical model taken from the early church. New believers were mentored in the Christian faith weeks before Easter, preparing for their baptisms at the Great Easter Vigil. The idea of giving something up for Lent came out of this tradition, when fasting—abstaining from food as an act of discipline in solidarity with others in the community—was used to raise one's spiritual consciousness and empty oneself before God.

Fasting or giving up something for Lent can be a good way to explore a deeper expression of faith, if not adopted as a show of piety, martyrdom, or moral righteousness. Some may find it meaningful to give something up for Lent, but to do so is not required. Some disciples may find a more valuable spiritual exercise in taking something on during Lent—a more Christ-like attitude toward others, a humble spirit at work, or a feeling of gratitude in the midst of scarcity. The spiritual discipline of giving up something or taking on something can help us prepare for or renew our baptisms as part of the resurrection celebration at Easter.

The season of Lent includes services other than Ash Wednesday. During Holy Week there will be Palm-Passion Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday services. Such services are a powerful reminder of the self-sacrificing love of God in Jesus Christ, who died on the cross for the atonement of our sins and was raised from the dead forever proclaiming that it is God who has the last word and that nothing in life or in death can ever separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus. Sadly, from my perspective, too many Christians move from the Alleluias of Palm Sunday right into Easter without ever facing and realizing the passion of Christ. I believe failure to experience this part of Jesus' journey weakens one's understanding of the story and gift of our salvation.

Therefore, I hope you will plan to attend each Lenten service, the mid-week Lenten programs that will be held on Wednesday evenings, the adult education class being planned, and will use the 40 days of Lent as a time of reflection about who you are as a disciple. In the process of this special, life-changing journey, may you develop a richer, more meaningful understanding of what it means that Christ died for you, Christ was raised, and Christ is alive.

### THE Christian CENTURY

The Christian Century is a mainstream Protestant biweekly publication whose motto is "Thinking Critically, Living Faithfully." Content includes news, reviews, columns, and poetry. The November 29 issue features a short article on Advent with a toddler, and a longer one on music and identity at four congregations. Sojourners is a progressive, evangelical, monthly

publication whose focus is "faith in action for social justice." It is published in Washington, D.C. by the Sojourners organization led by Jim Wallis. A recent cover story asks what kind of nation are we called to be: arrogantly superior or humbly exemplary. Another



article discusses how Paul wrestled with violent passages in the Hebrew Bible.

The Presbyterian Outlook is a biweekly publication about matters of importance with respect to the Presbyterian Church (USA). Periodicals

can be checked out for two weeks.

Several new books are now on our library shelves. In addition, let me remind you we now have a "browsing"



library where the books are arranged by subject matter.

The priority this year is to purchase CDs, and DVDs, in order to cater to our members who prefer these modalities over books.
